## 2021 Annual Meeting



More than 60 members and guests enjoyed the Society's Annual Meeting on October 11 at the *Ohio Taproom*. The *Howlers, Growlers and Ghosts* event began with a happy hour featuring a specialty spooky cocktail, seasonal brew and lite bites. A brief Society business meeting preceded a social gathering that included storyteller Kevin McAllister of the Ohio Taproom who shared spooky tales. Society Trustee Ruthanne James

and Society member Mike Curtin also shared personal memories of Lucinda and the Confectionary that previously occupied the Ohio

#### Taproom site.

Society Vice President Karen Riggs highlighted the Society's past year's activities: **new tours added to** *History Walks* (see article below), the introduction of this **quarterly e-news publication** and the **refresh of the Society's website** (more information in an accompanying article). Karen also highlighted what's in store for 2022, the primary activity being the Society's **triennial Tour of Homes in October**. The business included **election of four Board Trustees**: Marnie Hoag (affirming an earlier Board appointment), Jill Kuyper, Kendy Troiano, and Joanie Veri.

### **Marble Cliff Council Makes History**

Many consider history as something that has happened in the past. History, however, is being made every day. That certainly became true at Marble Cliff Village hall in 2021.

On April 19, 2021, Village Council appointed Charlotte Hickcox to an unexpired term as a member of Council. With this appointment, for the first time in the Village's 120 year history, its six-member Council was made up of a majority of women (four of six Council members). Hickcox, joined three other women already sitting as members of Council: Kendy Troiano,



Joanne Taylor and Marnie Hoag (effective July 1, 2021, Bridget Sarna replaced Hoag who moved from the Village). **The Society is proud to have both Troiano and Hoag serving as Trustees on the Society Board.** 

Troiano shares some thoughts about current Council, stating, "I am currently in my twelfth year on Marble Cliff Council...When I was first appointed to Council, I was the only woman on council In the past, the Council has had one or two women on board, but never a majority. This year - 2021 - has brought a new beginning for Marble Cliff as women are now the majority. In my opinion, having a majority of women on Village Council is a positive reflection of Marble Cliff and has created an environment that allows for more innovative ideas within Council. All of the women on Council bring a wide variety of backgrounds, experiences and perspectives to the table which is great for Marble Cliff and has a positive impact on the community as a whole. The addition of more women to Council has added balance and allows the community to see that having women on Council has helped build a strong, positive Council that works together to help the people of Marble Cliff."

The first woman Village Council member was Mertie Smithwho joined Council in the early 20th century (see her story below). Upon Smith's retirement in the 1950s, Council remained male dominated until the 1980s. Since then, most Councils have had at least one woman Council member.

Hoag also shares her insight as a past Council member, "In the Village of Marble Cliff, this is the first time in our history that we have had a majority of women elected to and serving on the Village Council at once – that is an incredible asset to our community to be able to reflect many perspectives and experiences. Local decision-making is stronger when everyone is involved. Everyone deserves a seat at the table regardless of gender or any other factor. We're better because of the diversity of thought and experiences within in our own community."

The recent elections maintained the make-up of Council for 2022 as both Troiano and Sarna were re-elected to Council along with colleagues Dow Voelker and Matt Jolson (only four of the six Council seats were up for election in 2021).

More than 800 of your friends and neighbors have downloaded the free <u>History Walks</u> app to date (<u>Apple App Store</u> or <u>Google Play Store</u>). The app offers walking tours of historic places, notable buildings, ecological landmarks, and other sights within our communities. Each tour is approximately two miles long and will take 1 to 2 hours to complete on foot.

# Mertie Smith: Marble Cliff's First Woman Council Member



From the middle of the 19th century, women demanded access to appointed and elected positions, ranging from notary public to mayor. However, the language in most laws, including those in Ohio, required that any elected office holder must be "an elector", or someone who has the ability to vote. Women were not allowed to vote, so they couldn't hold office.

Some states, including Ohio, passed laws that allowed women to be "elected" to school boards, and later added provisions that they could be appointed notaries. But higher offices, such as mayor, city council, or state or federal representative were off limits.

This all changed through ratification of the federal suffrage amendment in 1920, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution. Ohio ratified the Amendment, and even passed legislation in April of 1919 that would allow women the vote, in case the states failed to ratify it before the 1920 elections. As it turned out, by August of 1920, 36 states (including Ohio) ratified the amendment and it became part of the U.S. Constitution, ensuring that the right to vote could not be denied based on sex.

Almost immediately after the ratification, women appeared on the ballots across the country, and were elected to the offices they had been dreaming of holding. In Marble Cliff, Mertie Bennett Smith became a member of the Village Council, an elected position she would hold until her retirement in 1951 (The inset photo above shows Mertie Smith at her retirement after 30 years in elected office).

Mertie Bennett (some records show her name to be Myrtle, but birth and christening and marriage records show her given name to be Mertie) was born in Harlem in Delaware County in 1868 to Daniel and Margaret Bennett. She married McKendree Smith just before her 17th birthday. He was five years older than she was. They lived in various places in Ohio, including Ironton, where McKendree served as the superintendent of schools. He graduated medical school from The Ohio Medical College and in 1903 was appointed an instructor in Dermatology and Syphilology at the College. The following year Dr. Smith was named



the head of the Columbus Health Department, and served that organization until failing health in 1927 required him to retire.

One of his special assignments at the Board of Health was to determine why so many were dying of typhoid, and his experiments with the water system were instrumental in exposing sources of contamination in the northern watershed that provided the source of much of Columbus' drinking water. **Dr.**Smith used this expertise together with the political position Mertie Smith held on Village Council to upgrade the water and sewer systems of

**Marble Cliff**, resulting in clean drinking water and sanitary sewers for the residents.

Mertie was quoted as saying that two petitions to Village Council launched her 30 year career. The first was to upgrade the Village streets and add streetlights and sidewalks. She said that her initial petition was unsuccessful, and these modernizations would have to wait. Her second petition was successful, and the resulting ordinanceprohibited individuals from "parking their cows" in the Village because of the disturbance caused by their incessant mooing.



The Smiths lived on Tenth Ave. near Neil in 1900, where they rented rooms to eight students in their home. They moved to a rental on Cambridge Place before settling in their Marble Cliff home at 1520 Arlington Avenue, on the northeast corner of Arlington and Cardigan, which was built in 1913. The couple had a son Floyd and a daughter Louella, who married John Nau, who became an attorney and

served as Chief Magistrate (Mayor) of Marble Cliff. McKendree Smith died at home in 1928, and **Mertie lived at their home until her death in Macon, Georgia in 1960**.



We wish you "Seasons Greetings from the Grandview Heights/Marble Cliff Historical Society" by reprinting an historic greeting. Edward and Cora Bradbury and their children Alford, Irving, and Frances sent this Christmas card with a picture of their home to friends and family. They lived at 1297 Wyandotte Rd between 1920 and 1944. Edward was the Franklin County Sanitary Engineer, and his son Alford was the editor and chief of the first GHHS Highlander yearbook and a member of the first senior class. The home is presently owned by the George and Laura Carter family.
