### Students of History



History is a main subject in a student's curriculum. The classroom is routinely where most of us learn the history of our world, nation, and community. However, history can be learned in different settings. Following are local examples of how the Society has supported learning about the history of our communities.

### **Third Grade Walkabout**

Former Grandview Heights elementary teacher and current Society Trustee, Jill Kuyper, shared insights into the **Grandview Heights walkabouts** that


are part of the third-grade social studies curriculum.

"The walks are not anything like the walkabouts of the Australian Aboriginal Society in either scope or intent, although some students think the walks are much longer than they ever imagined. In preparation for the walks, **students study maps, read about the history of people and places in Grandview Heights and Marble Cliff**, view a slideshow, watch the Tri-Village segment of **WOSU's Columbus Neighborhoods**, and watch "Grandview 101" (see below).

The culminating events are two morning walks led by classroom teachers equipped with megaphones. One walk focuses on the **Bank Block** and the second covers as **much of Goodale Blvd.** and **Marble Cliff** as possible. Dry throats and tired feet are sometimes remedied by parents providing rest stops along the way complete with water and a possible snack. These walkabouts **help eight and nine-year-old children realize how Grandview Heights and Marble Cliff came to be."** 

#### **Grandview 101**


Grandview 101 is a video developed by Edison Intermediate School students under the direction of teachers Tami Biandudi, Jean Gartland, and Marc Alter, and with input from the Society. This oral history features individual vignettes including: community history, school history, Grandview Heights traditions, Bobcat athletics, and "what makes Grandview unique." The students used



Society resources as source material, developed all content, and narrated and starred in the production. The video also features cameo appearances by former Grandview Heights Schools' teachers and staff. The 30-minute video can be viewed by clicking *here*.

### **A Young Local Historian**

Meghan Watters begins her 2019 book, Keeping Tradition Alive in Grandview Heights: A 70-Year History of the Cake Walk, with a TriVillage News (11/11/48) article, "Did You Ever See A Cake Walk?". In the article, local citizens "were invited to share in the fun at the Cake Walk in the Grandview High School Auditorium, November 22, 1948, at 8:00 pm....The entire family will enjoy the fun and the delicious homemade cakes you may win." The Cake Walk has remained the "social event of the season" to this



day, sponsored by the Grandview Band Parents Association, with music provided by Grandview Heights School Bands.

Her paperback book and Kindle versions are available on *Amazon*, In her narrative on Amazon, Meghan states a reason for her project, "I also want to promote the idea that history is an important part of who we are as a community – it defines us and shapes our future."

### **History Walks: Kid's History Hike**

The tour, one of 11 available in the free *History Walks* app, is designed especially for children to understand how Grandview Heights and Marble Cliff, and the people living in these communities, have changed over time. The tour was developed through a collaboration of the Society, Grandview Heights Public Library, and Grandview Heights Schools.

Operas and operettas are a long-standing tradition at R.L. Stevenson Elementary School dating back to the school's opening in 1927 when they were used as fundraisers.
