MEMORIES: A Reprise

The end-of-year always generates memories: sweet and bittersweet, sometimes challenging, and often heartwarming. Herewith are a few memories gleaned from a long-running, fondly remembered Tri-Village News Christmas tradition:

The Tri-Village Christmas Family.

rom 1956 until 1985 the *Tri-Village News*, published for many years from offices on Grandview Avenue south of West Third Avenue, chose a multigenerational family from the area as a front-page feature for the issue closely preceding Christmas Day.

The roster includes, in chronological order from 1956, the following families: Trautwine-Mulholland; Kelley; Laylin; Aschinger; Niple; Smith; Rader-Rankin; Murphy-Long; Postle; Hadley, Cameron; Bricker; Sayers-Thompson; Lawyer-Cavendish; Edwards; Wiltberger; Folkert-Tice; Guthrie, Poulton; Pickett; Lorenz; Abbot; Glass; Riley; Alban; Martina; France; Todd; Antolino; and Hord.

Most years, a TVN reporter conducted extensive interviews with the "Christmas Family." Because multigenerational families were always chosen, the resulting articles are a wonderful blend of Christmas memories (some extending back more than a century from 2009), family history and tradition, professional and business connections, and even family jokes.

HRISTMAS AMILY MEMORIES: A Reprise

The Earliest Memory

In 1982 the TVN Christmas Family was that of Claudine Urlin France, born before 1900 in the "Urlin Mansion" to George Cambridge Urlin, founder of Grandview, and his wife, Alice. The community's name came from Alice Urlin's exclamation at the view from the top of the tower, "What a grand view!" Shortly thereafter, her husband filed a development plat, Grandview Plat No. 1. Claudine Urlin married



Urlin Mansion


Milton France in the tower room of the house. A home was built for them in "the north pasture", now 1042 Urlin Avenue.

In 1982, Mrs. France was living in Summit Chase, 1000 Urlin Avenue, on the site of her birthplace, where an Urlin descendant still lives today. She reminisced,

"I remember Christmas when my sister Margaret and I were young. Our tree was lighted with candles, topped with an angel, and trimmed by Santa Claus on Christmas Eve. We hung our stockings on the big fireplace in the reception hall, and Christmas morning we'd look over the balustrade to see what toy was peeking out of the top.

Then we'd wait until mother and father took us downstairs, past the double sliding doors into various rooms, to the dining room for breakfast. After breakfast father would slide open the doors with a flourish to the room containing our tree. There was always a little village spread out under the tree with houses and a church, cows and horses inside a fence, and a lake made of a mirror."

Music for Christmas



Lowell and Beth Riley and their family were chosen as the Christmas Family in 1979. We quote:

"The music of Christmas - choirs singing, the sound of bells, the peal of an organ - has always been an important part of that celebration for Lowell and Beth Riley, and Christmas Eve services at First Community Church are what the Riley children, Marianne, "Gunner," and T. J. remember most.

Lowell was organist and music director at First Community from 1941 to '71. He originated the Christmas Eve service in the '40s, which became so popular it was increased to two services, and then to three, and he started the Children's Choir, in which both Marianne and Gunner sang."

Lowell Riley founded Vaud-Villities in 1942 and by 1979 he was still writing, arranging music, rehearsing and directing, and Beth had appeared in every performance. Lowell's career began at WBNS Radio in 1934, shortly after he and Beth graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University.

"...the year Teri asked for a highchair and playpen for her doll. She had such confidence that Santa would always fill her request that I was so furious when I learned that Marlene hadn't been able to find them that I stormed out of the house and got lucky...bought both at Western Auto on Fifth Avenue.

The trip was worth it when I saw Teri's face on Christmas morning."
