

Recent Collections Received:

• Roy Obnsman, GHHS '25: Scrapbook and other ephemera.

Roy was from one of the earliest families to locate in Grandview. He was a fine athlete, particularly a baseball pitcher. After high school he married Anna Parker GHHS '26. Anna passed away in December 2008 at age 101. Their daughters, Barbara, GHHS '54 and Nancy, GHHS '58 generously donated an assortment of memorabilia. The collection includes a 1928 summer baseball league trophy and a 1925 class composite.



• Keitz Scrapbooks:

Bob Keitz, GHHS '39, died this past spring and his widow, Jean, donated

his scrapbook, which basically covers the football year 1938.

Bob's brother, Don Keitz, GHHS '43, also donated his scrapbook of sports articles from the 1942-43 era.

Grandview Civic 90th Anniversary

Happy 90th Birthday to Grandview Civic Welfare Club, the longest continuously operating community organization in the Tri-Village area! At the club's monthly meeting on October 13 Grandview Mayor Ray DeGraw proclaimed the day "Grandview Civic Welfare Day." Founded in September 1920 by eleven Grandview women, the current membership of 80-plus contributed more than \$6,000 this year in cash and in kind donations to various community projects.

• Jeanne Jones Holder Scrapbooks:

Jeanne has previously donated a number of scrapbooks from her mother Alleyne Higgs Jones, GHHS '22.We recently received 1940s sports and school activities material from Jeanne's personal scrapbooks. Of particular interest is a copy of her mother's 1913 promotion certificate from the Primary Department to the Junior Department of the Congregational Sunday School (predecessor of First Community Church). In 1913 the church was still meeting at the old Harding School, now the site of the former Grandview Kindergarten building. Also of interest is an original Order of Worship from the 1924 dedication of the new First community Church, and a number of interesting photos.

All of the above collections have been indexed and archived. Material from each of these collections will be used in future Moment in Time features in *ThisWeek Grandview* as well as in *ViewPoints*.

• The Bobcat:

From the high school we have received two bound volumes of the Grandview Heights High School newspaper, *The Bobcat*, from the years 1947-1961. There are also two photographs, one from the 1920s and the other showing 12 girls from the class of 1947 in varsity football uniforms, an idea conceived by Miss Emily Peterson, longtime Grandview girls' athletic advisor. Also included are photos of the high school building under construction in 1922-23 and information concerning the closing of the 1919 school year 6 weeks early due to the Spanish flu pandemic that year.

• Barbara Campbell Durant, GHHS '43:

The Grandview Heights Alumni Association recently received a letter detailing Barbara's 35-year professional career as a violinist with the Los Angeles Symphony. Barbara's classmates were delighted but not at all surprised to hear of her many accomplishments. Barbara's parents were the chauffeur and cook for the G. Edwin Smith family at 1179 Fairview Avenue. Receipt of this letter prompted research into the Smith family, and revealed a granddaughter living in Prescott Place in Marble Cliff. From her we have received copies of a 50th anniversary booklet of the G. Edwin Smith Shoe Company, as well as a pamphlet honoring the 75th anniversary of the founding of the Columbus YMCA. Other items include a Smith family photo taken inside the Fairview home, as well as a drawing of G. Edwin Smith that hung for many years over the bar at Scioto Country Club.A future ViewPoints article on the Smith family will outline the many accomplishments of this distinguished former Grandview resident.

Rooks Fund High School Media Center Renovation

Cembers of The Brotherhood of the Rook, a former Grandview Heights High School fraternity, founded in 1915 and ended in 1961 when high school fraternities were banned in Ohio, recently continued their long history of community support by funding the renovation of the high school media center. Funds remaining from the 1960s sale of the Rooks former club house were provided to the high school for upgrading the former library. A new floor and ceiling were installed, a wall moved to provide more appropriate space for today's technology, and a new multipurpose room created. Improvements also included a new circulation desk and an informal read and study area for students. During its history, more than 500 GHHS students were members of The Brotherhood of the Rook. A reception at the high school in early October gave former Rooks an opportunity to see the results of their contribution, which will benefit many students in the years ahead. Community members are welcome to check in at the school office and take a look at the new media center.

A Nod to Nog

The following appeared in The *Community News* of December 29, 1922. (The *Community News* was the community's first weekly newspaper, published by First Community Church.)

Here are some beverages which will give the finishing touch to your New Year's celebration, harmless though they be.

George Washington Egg-Nog

Three quarts of milk, one dozen eggs, one and one-fourth pound finely powdered sugar. Use any desired flavoring. Mix sugar and egg yolks to a cream, then add stiffly beaten whites and milk. Make and use the same day.

Mock Champagne

Slice a large lemon and bruise an ounce of ginger root. Pour two quarts boiling water over this and stand it away until cooled to a blood heat.Add an ounce of tartaric acid and half a cake of yeast. Put in sun for a day and at night put in bottles and fasten the corks down with wire. It will be ready for use in two or three days. Serve with cracked ice.


