DEATH OF A CHARACTER



1922 - Dude, Field Days

efore newspaper cartoon strips were relegated to the limbo of a mere insert among the advertising glossies of the Sunday edition, there was a time when the stories they carried were of great significance in American popular culture.

We were reminded of those times while reading Robert C. Harvey's recent biography of cartoonist Milton Caniff (1907-1988): *MEANWHILE...A Biography of Milton Caniff*, Creator of Terry and the Pirates *and* Steve Canyon (Seattle, 2007).

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Caniff was a Hillsboro native and OSU graduate, whose papers formed the founding nucleus of the prestigious OSU Cartoon Research Library. The biography was underwritten, in part, by a grant rom the Milton Caniff Endowment of the Cartoon Research Library.

When Raven Sherman, a "Terry" character who ran a refuge for Chinese orphans, died in the arms of her lover, Dude Hennick, on October 16, 1941, after lingering for 11 daily installments, public outcry was instantaneous. The elevator operator in Caniff's New York building called him a murderer, employees of a candy company had a casket blanket of flowers shipped to him, and for more than forty years grief-stricken cards edged in black arrived in his mailbox.

It was generally known that "Terry" character Dude Hennick was Caniff's first character based on real life, and there was an assumption that Raven also had a living counterpart.

Dude Hennick was in fact based on Frank "Dude" Higgs (1907-1945), Grandview native and OSU classmate and friend of Milton Caniff. Caniff had begun the strip in 1934, with a story line

involving situations with Chinese pirates and warlords. By 1937the Japanese had invaded China and the Sino-Japanese War was in full swing. In March 1938 Terry entered the war. Henry Luce, publisher of Time and Life, had grown up in China and covered the war extensively, despite the United States' official neutrality, providing a source of realistic detail for Caniff.

In late spring 1938 Frank Higgs, who was in New York, called Caniff with the information that he had resigned his commission in the U.S. army Air Corps, and was leaving for Kunming, China to

help Claire Chennault train Chinese pilots for Chiang Kai-Shek's fledgling air force. And so was born Caniff's Dude Hennick character, based on Frank Higgs' appearance and mannerisms, eyebrows straight across, shock of dark hair, and extroverted behavior. The

Dude's cartoon surname memorialized Herb Hennick's restaurant at 15th and High, a favorite college hangout, where Caniff had once earned a week's meals by decorating the walls with portraits of campus heroes. For the next seven years "Dude" Higgs' letters to Caniff provided a first-hand source of authentic China detail for Terry and the Pirates.

In November 1945 the Higgs family and Caniff received word that Frank Higgs had died in the crash of a plane he was piloting, taking supplies for Chiang Kai-Shek from China to Taiwan. Sabotage was suspected. Caniff honored his friend and confidant in the cartoon strip of December 25, 1945. (See....)

In a note of sympathy to Cniff, Clare Both Luce wrote, "I shall always feel a sense of personal gratitude to him for the hitchhike he gave me out of Burma in the Stilwell retreat days. Things might have been very different with me if he had not

come into Lashio on the bombed-out field and taken me to Kunming.

Dude Higgs was a romantic figure, full of a quiet and gay courage. it is men like him who have helped to fill what Wendell Wilkie once called "the reservoir of good will" for America in China." (Harvey, p. 491)



"THE DAFFODIL MAN"

Every spring for nearly a century Grandview residents have been enjoying the daffodils spilling down the bluffside below 1085 Westwood Avenue. They are a legacy of Professor Wendell Paddock, "The Daffodil Man," who purchased the home when he joined Ohio State's horticulture department in 1909. He retired in 1940 as professor emeritus and chair of the department. A native of southwest Michigan, raised in a log house built by his father, Paddock graduated from Michigan State at age 29 after teaching for years in country schools. He came to OSU from Colorado State.
